Sheffield has suffered two great floods in 1864 and 2007. There were similarities and differences between these two events.


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Key Vocabulary

Bronze Age: a period in human history that started between 3000BCE and 1200BCE when people began using bronze for tools and weapons.

Settlement: a small gathering of people who are living in same area.

Civil War: A conflict between two groups of people living within the same country or area.



Castle: a large defended building, usually built during the Middle Ages, to protect people from attack. Industrial Revolution: The period in history where humans began to use machines to complete most of their work.

Factory: A building in which machines are used to create different goods and items.

Coal Mine: A large entrance into the earth from which coal is taken.

Strike: When people refuse to work to try and force their employer to improve their working conditions.
